

A recent survey found

65%

of Minnesotans agreed that the health care system needs to change.

If we don't do anything, health care spending for Minnesotans will more than double by 2033, leaving less money for other priorities.

The Center for Health Care Affordability will serve as a catalyst to address health care spending and affordability.

Minnesota stakeholders and an advisory body will provide recommendations to the Center through public meetings. The Center will provide recommendations on how to reduce administrative spending and low-value care, and implement a rural health value-based payment model.

Initiatives include identifying health care cost drivers and ways to limit spending growth.
