Topic:

Sexual Violence and People with Disabilities:
Problem and Prevention

The focus of this workshop is to examine the problem of sexual violence of people with disabilities within the framework of the Spectrum of Prevention. The information provided about the problem in relationship to people with disabilities is meant to supplement what victim advocates already know about sexual violence.

Participants will develop an understanding of the problem at multiple system levels. Specific strategies for primary prevention will be presented for each of the six levels of prevention with an opportunity for participants to share their own ideas for primary prevention.

Presenter Dr. Nancy Fitzsimons has over 20 years working and collaborating with people with developmental and other disabilities. She developed disability abuse prevention curriculum for the State of Illinois. She was the project director of three federal grants dealing with disability violence and abuse prevention.

Dr. Fitzsimons co-authored an on-line curriculum and authored the accompanying workbook for training police officers in Minnesota about victimization of people with disabilities titled Shadow Victims: Crimes Against People with Disabilities. She authored a book published by Paul H. Brookes in March 2009 titled Combating Violence and Abuse of People with Disabilities: A Call to Action.

Nancy is an Associate Professor of Social Work at Minnesota State University, Mankato and the director of the Master of Social Work program.

On January 27, 2010, at 1 p.m., in commemoration of National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month, the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC), in coordination with the Office on Violence Against Women, will present a Web Forum discussion with Suzanne Koeplinger, M.A., and Alexandra (Sandi) Pierce, Ph.D., on best practices for assisting American Indian victims of sex trafficking.

Ms. Koeplinger is the Executive Director of the Minnesota Indian Women's Resource Center in Minneapolis, which provides social services and education to American Indian women and their families. She is of Canadian Mohawk and European ancestry, and has a background in international project development, communications, domestic violence advocacy, and fundraising.

Dr. Pierce is an adjunct faculty member of the Sociology Department and the Master's Program in Community Psychology at Metropolitan State University in Minnesota and is the principal investigator and author of *Shattered Hearts: The Commercial Sexual Exploitation of American Indian Women and Girls in Minnesota*.

She is of Seneca and European descent and the senior consultant for Othayonih Research and Evaluation Services LLC.

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11. MNCASA's Minnesota Summit

The Minnesota Department of Health was honored to be a co-sponsor of Minnesota Coalition Against Sexual Assault (MNCASA) Minnesota Summit to Prevent Sexual Violence. The goals of the Summit were to advance The Promise of Primary Prevention of Sexual Violence: A Five-Year Plan to Prevent Sexual Violence and Exploitation in Minnesota and to identify and engage new Minnesota Champions.

This amazing event was hosted by MNCASA with a strong leadership team and supported by five State agencies: The Minnesota Departments of Health, Corrections, Public Safety, Education and Human Services. No small task!

One hundred leaders from industry, government, media, faith, and nonprofit sectors, and 100 "issue experts" were invited to discuss how sexual violence affects everyone and how we all play a role in prevention.

The Minnesota Summit incorporated thoughtful presenters and youthful entertainers to state the problem. Each session had a speaker or panel presenting a specific message or challenge, followed by artistic skits and songs to trigger thought and broaden discussion. We emphasized the need for organizational practices and

policy and legislation using the Spectrum of Prevention from the Prevention Institute .

The technology afforded participants access to a laptop at each table and text messaging systems so that information was collected, synthesized, and returned to participants for review and action planning. This allowed for quick voting and prioritizing of shared ideas. Each person was asked to commit to action steps to follow in their spheres of influence.

A lot of information was collected and shared with innovative ways to incorporate sexual violence prevention into existing business programs. Participants left with a sense of commitment and a personal promise to work towards a world without sexual violence.

The Summit was not an isolated event, but rather a vehicle to serve as a catalyst for actions that will continue to advance the Minnesota State Plan to Prevent Sexual Violence. Several other states expressed interest in hosting state summits modeling after ours. David Lee from California's Coalition Against Sexual Assault (CALCASA) taped many of the presentations and "tweeted" throughout the day.

Cordelia Anderson, who initiated the thought of a state Summit, also chairs the National Coalition to Prevent Sexual Violence and they are helping to design the National Summit to Prevent Sexual Violence and Exploitation of Children on June 15-16 in Arlington, VA. This will be hosted by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children. We are extremely lucky to have Cordelia's vision, knowledge and energy residing right here in Minnesota!

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12. From Male Voice: Network Challenges Hotel Pornography

Male Voice magazine's Winter 2010 edition reported on Minnesota's efforts to challenge hotel pornography.

Network Challenges Hotel Pornography

A men's network in Minnesota is spearheading efforts to curb sexually violent and degrading material in public places with a current focus on hotel room porn.

The Minnesota Men's Action Network: Alliance to Prevent Sexual and Domestic Violence has drafted the anti-porn in hotels initiative with the Minnesota Department of Health's Sexual Violence Prevention Program.

The effort, according to Chuck Derry of the Gender Violence Institute, where the Men's Action Network is located, "is part of a growing primary prevention plan to stem sexually violent and degrading material becoming accessible and mainstreamed into our social environment."

The Clean Hotel Initiative encourages business, public and private organizations, and municipalities to modify their meeting facility policy to clarify that meetings and conferences only will be held in facilities that do not offer in-room adult pay-per-view pornography. Additionally, Derry says, the recommendation calls for travel policies to be amended to reimburse employees' lodging costs only when staying at hotels that do not offer the in-room adult pay-per-view porn.

The Men's Action Network has created several documents that can assist others interested in developing policies at state and local levels of government, as well as with private businesses, organizations, and agencies.

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14. U.S. Report: Rape, Sexual Abuse in Juvenile Corrections Facilities

Bureau of Justice Statistics study exposes epidemic of abuse in juvenile facilities, underscores call for new standards

Washington, DC, January 7, 2010. A long-awaited report from the Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) finds that youth in juvenile corrections facilities are sexually abused at alarming rates and are victimized significantly more often than adult inmates.

A shocking 12.1 percent -- or almost one in eight -- of the detained youth who participated in the survey reported sexual abuse at their current facility during the previous year. On any given day, there are approximately 93,000 youth confined in juvenile facilities, more than half of whom are 16 or younger.

"These figures are unconscionable, and even more so when you consider that the survey did not include youth locked up in adult facilities, where many are at even greater risk for abuse," said Lovisa Stannow, Executive Director of Just Detention International.

The study -- "Sexual Victimization in Juvenile Facilities Reported by Youth, 2008-09" -- is based on a survey given to 9,198 youth detainees in 195 facilities from all fifty states and the District of Columbia. The BJS report also included these findings:

- 80 percent of the reported abuse was perpetrated by a member of the facility's staff.
- 95 percent of youth who alleged abuse by staff reported at least one female perpetrator.
- Victimized youth usually endured repeated sexual abuse, often more than ten times, and frequently by multiple perpetrators.
- 65 percent of youth who had previously been sexually assaulted at another facility also reported having been sexually abused in their current facility.
- Youth with a sexual orientation other than heterosexual reported being sexually abused by another inmate at a rate more than ten times higher than that of youth who identified as heterosexual.

In June 2009, as mandated by Congress, the National Prison Rape Elimination Commission issued a comprehensive report on sexual violence in U.S. detention facilities. The bipartisan Commission, led by U.S. District Court Judge Reggie B. Walton, found that many corrections facilities do a poor job preventing, identifying, and responding to the sexual abuse of those in their custody.

The Commission's report emphasized that sexual abuse is an especially complex problem for younger inmates, explaining that "juveniles are not yet fully developed physically, cognitively, socially, and emotionally and are ill-equipped to respond to sexual advances and protect themselves."
