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6. New research on MN teens links sexual abuse history to increased pregnancy risk

A new study, documented in Perspectives on Sexual and Reproductive Health, 2004, 36(3):98-105, concluded "teenage pregnancy risk is strongly linked to sexual abuse, especially for males and those who have experienced both incest and nonfamilial abuse. To further reduce the U.S. teenage pregnancy rate, the pregnancy prevention needs of these groups must be adequately addressed."

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7. Rape and Alcohol: The Connection

Sexual assault and alcohol use on college campuses is an all-too-frequent occurrence. The facts and statistics are presented in a pamphlet that was updated in July 2004. Also included in the pamphlet is a:
