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1. April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month

For several years, the [National Sexual Violence Resource Center \(NSVRC\)](#) has promoted the slogan *Decide to End Sexual Violence* as part of the annual campaign, usually with a tag line added. This year, the NSVRC 2005 National Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM) Campaign still incorporates that basic starting point but adds a new emphasis on building healthy, respectful relationships. This focus brings together important elements of a positive approach to raising awareness and promoting prevention of sexual violence. [Positively Informed: Lesson Plans and Guidance for Sexuality Educators and Advocates](#): A resource kit of lesson plans and guidance for comprehensive sexuality educators, Positively Informed provides a handpicked selection of some of the best English-language sexuality education materials out there. Intended to serve as a source of ideas, examples, and inspiration for educators developing their own sexuality education curricula, the lesson plans use creative, interactive, learner-centered teaching strategies, and are adaptable to diverse cultural settings. The plans address gender issues, challenge discriminatory attitudes and behaviors, and present sexuality as a positive part of life rather than something to be feared and shrouded in taboos. These

lessons are appropriate for 10- to 19-year-olds and are classroom ready.

The R Factor: Building Resiliency in Young Adults, A Dads Make a Difference™ Program: This is an umbrella program for two exciting curricula, 1) the original Dads Make a Difference™ curriculum taught by older teens to middle school-age youth, and 2) *The R Factor: Building Resiliency in Young Adults™*, taught primarily by teachers to students ages 16 to 20 years.

A Parent's Handbook: How to Talk to Your Children About Developing Healthy Relationships: Helps adults create an environment in which they can give their pre-teen boys and girls the skills with which to have positive, healthy relationships with peers and in dating situations.

Healthy Relationships Curriculum: Curriculum to help students analyze the culture of violence that condones abusive behavior to help empower them to create the violence-free culture of tomorrow.

According to research conducted at the University of Minnesota, approximately 500 men and 1,300 women at the University of Minnesota experience unwanted sexual contact each year.

How to Help a Sexual Assault Survivor: What Men Can Do

The Aurora Center is co-sponsoring The National Organization of Men's Outreach for Rape Education (NO MORE), whose approach is to end sexual assault through groundbreaking research and educational programming, with Intercollegiate Athletics. Primarily targeting male audiences, this group of four men aims to empower men to be part of the solution rather than blame them for contributing to the problem.

NO MORE has developed a program titled *The Men's Program - 1 in 4*, with the subheading *How to Help a Sexual Assault Survivor: What Men Can Do*. The program aims to increase victim empathy, teach men how they can help women recover from rape and sexual assault, and finally encourage men to change their own behavior and influence others.

The program is facilitated by four men who graduated from William and Mary College (Williamsburg, Virginia) in 2004. As founding members of their college chapter of NO MORE, they will spend nine months traveling across the country, bringing *The Men's Program - 1 in 4* to college and high school campuses.

The program is presented in a non-confrontational nature and its objective is to increase men's empathy for survivors of sexual violence. A segment of the program focuses on how men can help survivors, as well as work to prevent sexual violence on a daily basis. The peer educators review the importance of discussing a survivor's medical and safety needs, and encourage the participants to listen, believe, and support the survivor's decisions. Peer educators also discuss the effects of sexist jokes and attitudes that are prevalent within our culture. They ask the men to examine their own behaviors, encouraging them to condemn sexual violence on a daily basis.

Remember Suz is dedicated to educating people regarding the effects and prevalence of sexual violence. Myths surrounding sexual assault and rape help perpetrate a violent cycle that claims a woman every 2 minutes. Because of this correlation, education and understanding are imperative to ending sexual violence against women.

Jayne Hanson, founder of Remember Suz, lost her daughter Susie to suicide. Susie's case was not a high profile case involving abduction by a stranger. Susie was raped when she was 15 years old. Like most rape victims, she was assaulted in a familiar environment by a trusted perpetrator. After 5 years of silently suffering the fear, shame, trauma and depression that haunts survivors of sexual assault, Susie took her life. Her family is left to wonder - if she had access to programs available for sexual assault survivors, if she had been taught about the realities of sexual violence, perhaps Susie would be here today.

Jayne has been speaking about Susie's tragedy and her family's loss for over 3 years. She weaves her passionate and poignant story with facts of sexual violence in the United States. Blunt, educational, and most importantly personal, Susie's story brings a face and a name to the realities of sexual violence.

4. Research on sexual violence in the culturally deaf community

The Council on Crime and Justice has been conducting research on sexual violence in the culturally deaf community with a grant from the National Institute of Justice. Two reports have been produced detailing participatory approaches to conducting research in this cultural context and an analysis of the service provider perspective. We will be releasing two other reports-community member perspectives that include survivor stories and the deaf male perspective later this year.

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5. Statewide Video conference with Victor Vieth, Director of the National Child Protection Training Center

Prevent Child Abuse Minnesota, with the support of the Minnesota Department of Health, is offering a six-location video conference with Victor Vieth on Wednesday, May 18th, 8:30 A.M. until noon. As the Director of the National Child Protection Training Center, Dr. Vieth has unveiled an aggressive plan to eliminate child abuse in the U.S. in 120 years. Join us and learn of that national effort its progress, and about the rapid growth of the Center's new curriculum.

Victor will also provide a detailed look at the growth of child prostitution - including the frightening role played by Minnesota, the #1 source of child prostitutes for prostitution rings across the country.

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8. Juveniles Who Have Sexually Offended: A Review of the Professional Literature

In 2001, nearly 17 percent of arrests for forcible rape and 20 percent of arrests for other sex offenses involved youth age 17 or younger.

The problem of juvenile sex offending has another dimension. Many adult sex offenders began their abusive behavior as youth. Early intervention with juveniles who have sexually offended can be critical to preventing this progression.

To advance the knowledge base of policymakers and practitioners addressing this problem, the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention published, in 2001, *Juveniles Who Have Sexually Offended: A Review of the Professional Literature*. This comprehensive and documented Report examines the characteristics of juveniles who have committed sex offenses and the types of offenses they have committed, describes assessment methods and treatment approaches, and discusses program evaluation.
