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4. What's new from the MINCAVA Clearinghouse - Educator Sexual Misconduct: A Synthesis of Existing Literature

[*Educator Sexual Misconduct: A Synthesis of Existing Literature*](#)

Author: Charol Shakeshaft.

Description: This literature review of sexual abuse and sexual misconduct responds to the mandate in Section 5414 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended, to conduct a study of sexual abuse in U.S. schools. To satisfy this mandate, the Department of Education contracted with Dr. Charol Shakeshaft of Hofstra University. Using the limited research that is available in this area, her literature review describes, among other topics: prevalence of educator sexual misconduct, offender characteristics, targets of educator sexual misconduct, and

recommendations for prevention of educator sexual misconduct.

The [Minnesota Center Against Violence and Abuse \(MINCAVA\) Electronic Clearinghouse](#) has more educational resources about all types of violence, including higher education syllabi, published research, funding sources, upcoming training events, individuals or organizations which serve as resources, and searchable databases with over 1000 training manuals, videos and other education resources. 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6. National Internet Safety Month - June 2005

As the Internet has become more and more a part of our lives, young people have become more vulnerable to Internet crime, such as sexual approaches from child predators, exposure to pornography, and cyberbullying. In recognition of this growing concern, the United States Senate declared June, 2005, National Internet Safety Month.

The Youth Internet Safety Survey, commissioned by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) and supported by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention within the U.S. Department of Justice, found that between 1998 and 1999

- ▶ One in 5 youth had been sexually solicited online.
- ▶ One in 4 youth had unwanted exposure to sexual pictures online.
- ▶ One in 17 youth had been threatened or harassed online.

Since the survey, Internet crimes against youth have only increased as Internet use has grown dramatically.

To coincide with National Internet Safety Month, NCMEC and the Ad Council have launched a [public service announcement campaign](#) to raise awareness of online sexual exploitation of youth. The ads direct viewers to the [CyberTipline](#) for more information and to report Internet crimes against youth. [CyberTipline](#) has a teen section that gives teen-friendly safety advice for using the Internet, chatrooms, instant messaging, e-mail, and other online services. NCMEC works in partnership with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Bureau of Immigration and Customs Enforcement, U.S. Secret Service, U.S. Postal Inspection Service, state and local law enforcement, and Internet Crimes Against Children Task Forces, to maintain the [CyberTipline](#).

[I-SAFE](#), an Internet safety education and awareness program supported by the U.S. Congress and the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, also offers information for youth, parents, educators, and law enforcement on its Web site.

In addition, the U.S. Department of Justice's National Criminal Justice Reference Service has compiled [Internet Safety](#), which includes internet safety for children, cyberstalking, cyberbullying, and related topics.

7. Outward Bound, *Women of Courage*

Since 1985, Outward Bound Canada and since 1996, Outward Bound USA has been offering women survivors of violence the opportunity to participate in a specially designed seven-day course called [Women of Courage](#). The course brings women, who share a common history, together to share a powerful experience, while discovering the beauty and serenity of the natural world. Empowering women to recognize that they are capable of far more than they ever realized. It is a time to explore perceived limits and to expand capabilities, which allows them to return to their regular lives with a renewed sense of strength and competency.

The [Outward Bound Women of Courage](#) program is designed for women who have experienced some sort of violence in their lives, be it childhood sexual and/or physical abuse, sexual assault, or an abusive adult relationship. The women enrolled in Women of Courage are beyond the crisis phase of responding to their abuse. Courses are open to women, age 18 and up, who have completed or are nearing the completion of a traditional group or individual counseling program.

This course reinforces the essential themes of therapy

- ▶ women as survivors rather than victims
- ▶ women have the right to live healthy lives, free of violence.

The program also provides a time and a place for the next stage of healing where the women can explore who they are beyond being survivors.
