2. Dads Make a Difference Teen Trainings: October 24, 2005 in Mankato, November 13-14 in Plymouth

Dads Make a Difference? is a Minnesota statewide paternity education program of Concordia University Saint Paul where senior high teens, male and female, are trained to teach a 4-lesson curriculum about the importance of fathers in children's lives to youth in grades 6-8. *Dads Make a Difference Teen Trainings*: A service-learning, youth development, leadership opportunity for teens. Teens, along with an adult advisor, attend training to learn the content and gain the skills needed to teach. This prevention program designed to help prevent too-early parenting and increase the involvement of the future generation of fathers, the curriculum helps older teens discuss the legal, financial, and emotional responsibilities of parenting with younger youth.

3. Free Jacob Wetterling Foundation On-line Safety Workshop, November 15, 2005

Jacob Wetterling Foundation (JWF) and the Anoka County Child Abuse Prevention Council have teamed up with the support of Connexus R Energy to help adults and communities learn how to better protect children and teenagers. A personal and online safety workshop for families and professionals will be held at Spring Lake Park School District 16, Community Service Fine Arts Center the evening of November 15, 2005, 6:30-8:00pm. The presentation will address common myths about child victimization and will include current statistics and trends related to child safety. Additionally, the workshop will include safety messages and skills for families such as encouraging children and teenagers to check first with parents before going anywhere with anyone or accepting gifts, learning to trust instincts about safe and unsafe situations, selecting safe and appropriate caregivers for children and much more.
