Description

Jacob Wetterling Foundation (JWF) is a private, non-profit 501(c)(3) agency established sixteen years ago on January 24, 1990. Following the 1989 abduction of their son, 11 year-old Jacob, from St. Joseph, Minnesota, Jerry and Patty Wetterling founded JWF to assist with all missing children cases, as well as child sexual exploitation cases, in communities throughout Minnesota. Jacob Wetterling Foundation educates, advocates and responds to reduce the number of missing and sexually exploited children and teens. This mission is what our current program is based upon, a combination of prevention education and victims assistance. Additionally, JWF works with policy makers and partner agencies to impact the development and passage of legislation on behalf of the safety and protection of children in Minnesota and on a national basis.

Duties

The Program Assistant Intern will be primarily responsible for responding to victims assistance calls by

providing appropriate guidance and referrals to and ongoing contact with individuals who have missing and/or sexually exploited children. This Intern may also assist in the following:

- ▶ Developing a victims assistance program protocol manual
- ▶ Helping to identify and recruit audiences for education training sessions
- ▶ Assisting in the development of training materials (e.g. handouts, visual aides)
- ▶ Conducting research for and assisting in drafting grant proposals
- ▶ Helping with the creation and submission of community education pieces to local print publications

JWFs flexible intern program allows individuals to meet specific educational requirements and needs while supporting the Foundation in meeting strategic and programmatic goals.

Qualifications

Undergraduate seniors or students pursuing graduate degrees in public health, social work, or psychology, should apply. Experience providing crisis services is required. Familiarity with child sexual abuse prevention programs and services are strongly desired. Strong written and oral communication skills is necessary for this position. Experience in conducting routing web site maintenance is a plus, though not a requirement.

Hours are flexible, but should include 10-15 hours per week. Office hours are Monday-Friday 9:00am-4:30pm. Duties will be completed both on and off site.

This is an unpaid internship.
