## *between Internet Communication Technologies and Violence Against Women*

This media brief, *Cultivating Violence Through Technology? Exploring the Connections between Internet Communication Technologies and Violence Against Women*, is a condensed version of the issue paper with the same title written by Jac sm Kee for APC WNSP. The paper explores the connection between new information communication technologies (ICTs) and violence against women. From the perspective of representation and rapid dissemination of information and communication enabled through ICTs, the paper looks at domestic violence in the homes, sexual violence and women in conflict affected areas. It presents case studies, strategies and analysis on these different areas.

### 5. Digital storytelling by Silence Speaks

Listen to survivors of violence against women take up multimedia technology, and tell their own powerful and transformative stories.

Digital storytelling by Silence Speaks is an initiative that makes it possible for survivors and witnesses of violence to come together in small groups, reflect on their gender training and experiences of abuse, and tell their stories in their own words, sounds, and images.

Few opportunities exist for survivors to tell their stories in their own words. Silence Speaks fills this gap by connecting survivors and witnesses of abuse with their creativity and making their voices the centerpiece of violence prevention and social justice efforts. Bearing witness to these stories moves the issue from the individual to the collective, and offers hope for ending the violence.

Twelve powerful stories are showcased on Take Back The Tech!, in partnership between Silence Speaks and APC Women's Programme.

## 7. Pediatricians Call for Limits on Advertising to Kids and Teens

Advertising is a \$250 billion a year business, and children and teens are lucrative targets for its messages, viewing 40,000 ads a year on TV alone. Advertisers increasingly seek to insert ads into school busses, schools, the Internet, movies, and video games.

Pediatricians, concerned about the effects of advertising on children and teens' health, have issued a call for strict limits on advertising to children. Citing the harmful effects of alcohol, tobacco, and drug advertising, food advertising and obesity, and sex in advertising, the American Academy of Pediatrics calls on doctors to be aware of the effects of advertising on children. The academy suggests media education for young people to help them understand the goals and effects of advertising, and also seeks to work with parents and community groups to ask the Federal government to establish limits on advertising to children.
