

Umrah Travel Checklist

Traveling still increases your chance for getting and spreading diseases like COVID-19, measles, and influenza. **Do not travel if you are sick.** Use this checklist as a guide for safer travel to Mecca, Saudi Arabia.

Before travel

- Make sure you are up to date on your travel vaccinations, including COVID-19, measles, and influenza. Ask your
 health care provider about other vaccines you might need before traveling. You can also use the <u>Find COVID-19</u>
 <u>Vaccines (vaccines.gov/search)</u> tool.
- Know current health requirements in Saudi Arabia. Find information at <u>The Embassy of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia:</u> Hajj and Umrah Health Requirements (www.saudiembassy.net/hajj-and-umrah-health-requirements).
- Consider getting tested for COVID-19 right before you travel. <u>AICS (https://aicsmn.org/)</u> provides FREE PCR testing Monday through Thursday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at their Minneapolis office (1433 E Franklin Ave Suite 13B).

Make sure to pack:

- High-quality, well-fitting masks for everyone traveling in your group.
- Emergency contact information.
- Travel-size hand sanitizer.
- Prescription medications and any other over-the-counter medications you may need.
- COVID-19 rapid tests. Minnesotans can order free at-home rapid tests through <u>Say Yes! COVID Test</u> (https://sayyeshometest.org/). You can also get at-home tests at IANA's Minneapolis office (3355 Hiawatha Ave #202) from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Visit <u>IANA (www.ianaonline.org)</u> or call 612-874-0655.

During travel

- Respiratory infections are common on the pilgrimage. CDC recommends regular handwashing, wearing a facemask, and practicing physical distancing, if possible, during your travel.
- Wear a mask at mosques and other indoor community spaces, especially in crowded areas, when recommended or required.
- If you start to feel sick or have symptoms, use a COVID-19 rapid test.
 - ♦ If you test positive, wear a mask, do not travel, and follow local public health guidance about how long to stay away from others.

After travel

• If you are sick, go to a health clinic and let the health care provider know you recently traveled to Saudi Arabia. They can help determine if you need to be tested for travel-related diseases.
