There is a Need to Improve the Health and Safety of **Salon Workers**

- Salon workers often do not fall under the full regulation of MN-OSHA because they often rent the chair from which they work.
- Many salon workers, especially nail technicians are non-English speakers and immigrants.

Collaborative Cosmetology Work Group

- In collaboration with the Minnesota Board of Cosmetology (MBC), we formed a work group to investigate possible solutions, including eliminating toxic products and substitution of safer products.
 - Considering engineering and administrative controls
 - Discussed education of workforce
- A health and safety workshop was held for schools of cosmetology in June 2018.

Survey of Salon Workers

- We surveyed all of Minnesota's licensed salon workers with e-mail addresses.
- 46.6% salon workers report respiratory symptoms related to their work.
- Results indicated that additional health and safety training was needed for salon workers.
 - 18% had received no training on health and safety issues related to their work.
 - 11% report receiving training on breathing problems or Work-Related Asthma (WRA).

Lessons Learned

- Slow but steady progress keeps people at table and engaged in complex issues. Take to develop trust and get the right people a table.
- Identify the gaps and work to fill those gap this case a gap in regulations resulted in a protection for an entire group of workers.
- It takes many people to finally bring about change.
- Product safety cannot be determined by what is legal. As soon as one product is under control or "banned" another one of similar or even greater potential hazard is introduced.
- General principles of industrial hygiene and total worker health (TWH) apply to non-regulated as well as regulated industries.
