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






RFP Review



Motivation: Substance Use is the Leading Cause of Death for People Experiencing Homelessness

Hub Funding Source and Authorization

- Part of 2023 <u>Comprehensive Drug Overdose and</u> <u>Morbidity Prevention Act</u> (www.revisor.mn.gov/statutes/cite/144.0528)
- Act authorized "funding for emergency and shortterm housing subsidies through the homeless overdose prevention hub"

Grant Information

- Expect to award three grants
 - At least one grant will be awarded to an American Indian focused organization
- Maximum annual budget per grant of \$300,000
- Grant period: April 1, 2024 (est.) March 31, 2028

Eligible Applicants

- Community-based organizations
- Community health centers/federally qualified health centers
- Tribal governments
- Faith-based organizations
- Educational institutions
- County governments/community health boards
- Any other public or private non-profit, not-for-profit, and for-profit organizations



Grantee Requirements (if selected)

- Offer integrated housing and harm reduction services
- Logic model for how program will reduce fatal overdoses/poisonings and improve housing stability
- Quarterly progress reports with required data elements
- Support MDH evaluation



Priority Populations

- People living outside of Hennepin and Ramsey counties
- American Indian or African American populations at greatest risk of overdose
- People who are pregnant

Must show capacity to serve people in one or more of these categories, but don't need to exclusively serve these populations



Eligible Housing Services

- Up to six months of rental assistance
- Rental application fees and security deposits
- Furnishings (e.g., air mattresses, chairs, desks) and other move-in expenses
- Utility assistance
- Housing navigation services
- Making modifications or using technology (e.g., <u>Brave (www.brave.coop)</u> buttons and sensors) to prevent and respond to overdoses in shelter and housing facilities
- Legal assistance to help tenants at-risk of homelessness maintain their housing and avoid eviction
- Staffing required to plan, deliver, and monitor the housing assistance provided



Eligible Harm Reduction Services

- Naloxone purchasing, distribution, and training
- Drug testing equipment (e.g., fentanyl and xylazine test strips)
- Syringe exchange and purchase and distribution of other safer use supplies
- Drug user education for people experiencing homelessness
- Overdose response protocols in shelter and housing facilities
- Grief counseling and mental health services to people affected by overdose
- Culturally specific services (e.g., traditional medicines, traditional healers)
- Helping participants start or maintain medications for opioid use disorder and/or drug treatment programs
- Staffing required to plan, deliver, and monitor services provided



Health and Social Services

- Infectious disease prevention, testing, and linkage to care
- Wound care
- Reproductive health services
- Hygiene, supplies, storage
- Benefits, employment and income
- Social and cultural connections



Ineligible Expenses

- Fundraising
- Taxes, except sales tax on goods and services
- Lobbyists, political contributions
- Bad debts (includes rental arrears), late payment fees, finance charges, or contingency funds
- Land or property acquisition





Application and Review Process



Key Dates

- January 12, 4:30 p.m. CST: Deadline to submit questions about the RFP
- January 16, 4:30 p.m. CST: Deadline to submit Letter of Intent (encouraged but not required)
- January 31, 5:30 p.m. CST: Application deadline



Application Requirements

- Applicant Conflict of Interest Form (www.health.state.mn.us/about/grants/coiapplicant.pdf)
- Project Narrative
- Project Budget
- Due Diligence Review Form (www.health.state.mn.us/about/grants/duediligence.pdf)
- For collaborative applications, MOUs or letters of support to the lead applicant from partner organizations
- Submit all application materials in one email to <u>health.homelessness@state.mn.us</u>



Review Criteria

- Organizational Capacity: 15-points
- Population of focus: 15-points
- Service plan: 30-points
- Budget and budget justification: 10-points
- Health equity: 20-points
- Evaluation: 10-points
