 - English as Second Language (ESL) Classroom


Refugee Health Program Responsibilities

Coordination of Health Assessments include:

- Point of notification, for health purposes, of primary refugee arrivals into the state (State Refugee Coordinators and Resettlement Agencies (RAs) have a separate notification system).
 - Forward overseas medical records and data collection forms to facilitate health screenings.
- Provide instruction/guidance to local public health (LPH) and medical clinics.
- Assist LPH, RAs with health system navigation and challenges.
- Training and education for LPH, RAs, health care providers and communities.
- Source of contact for questions, issues, and concerns related to health.

Role of Local Public Health

- Collaborate with resettlement agency caseworker to assist new refugees in accessing health assessment.
- Assure a complete, culturally and linguistically competent health screening.
- Assist in provider education regarding screening protocols.
- Verify completion of health assessment.
- Notify MDH of all screening results.

Minnesota Resettlement Agencies

Agencies contracted by the U.S. Dept. of State to provide "initial reception and placement" services to newlyarrived refugees.

- Collaborate with State and Local Health Departments to ensure newly arrived refugee is linked with health care provider
 - ex: apply for insurance, communicate appointment and transportation information with refugee, notify State and Local Health Departments of new arrivals
- Provide health orientation

- Catholic Charities of Southern Minnesota (CCSMN)
- International Institute of Minnesota (IIMN)
- Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota (LSS, Twin Cities and St. Cloud)
- Minnesota Council of Churches (MCC)
- United Community Action Partnership (Willmar)*
 - *affiliated with USCCB to facilitate remote placements

Types of Medical Exams

- Overseas Visa Medical Examination
 - United States Public Health Service
- Domestic Refugee Health Assessment
 - Minnesota Department of Health
- Adjustment of Status Medical Examination
 - U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services
 - Needed to obtain a Green Card
 - Adjusts status from temporary to permanent resident

Domestic Refugee Health Screening: Best Practices

- Exam within the first 90 days of arrival
- Public health clinics and/or private providers



- summary reporting tool




Minnesota's Jurisdiction-Based Data Access Rights using eSHARE
