Foreword

The directory that follows contains information regarding Minnesota health care facilities and services that are licensed, certified, and registered as of March 15, 2023.

Hospitals and Nursing Homes

Hospitals, boarding care homes, outpatient surgical centers and supervised living facilities in Minnesota are licensed under the provisions of Minnesota Statutes sections 144.50 to 144.586. Nursing homes are licensed under the provisions of Minnesota Statutes sections 144A.01 – 144A.1888.

A **hospital** means an institution primarily engaged in providing, by or under the supervision of physicians, to inpatients (A) diagnostic services and therapeutic services for medical diagnosis, treatment, and care of injured, disabled or sick persons, or (B) rehabilitation services for the rehabilitation of injured, disabled, or sick persons.

A **psychiatric hospital** means an entire institution which is primarily engaged in providing, by or underthe supervision of a physician, psychiatric services for the diagnosis and treatment of mentally ill persons. A psychiatric wing or building of a general hospital would not be considered a psychiatric hospital.

An **outpatient surgical center** means a freestanding facility organized for the specific purpose of providing elective outpatient surgery for pre-examined, pre-diagnosed, low risk patients.

A **nursing home** means a facility or that part of a facility which provides nursing care to five or more persons. Nursing care means health evaluation and treatment of patients and residents who are not in need of an acute care facility but who require nursing supervision on an inpatient basis.

A **boarding care home** provides personal or custodial care only. Examples of personal or custodial care include: help with bathing, dressing, or other personal care; supervision of medications which can be safely self- administered; plus a program of activities and supervision required by persons who are not capable of properly caring for themselves.

A **supervised living facility** provides a residential, homelike setting for persons who are intellectually disabled, adult mentally ill, chemically dependent, or physically handicapped. Services include provision of meals, lodging, housekeeping services, health services, and other services provided by either staff or residents under supervision. Class A facilities include homes for ambulatory and mobile persons who are capable of taking appropriate action for self-preservation under emergency conditions as determined by program licensure provisions. Class B facilities include homes for ambulatory, non-ambulatory, mobile or nonmobile persons who are not mentally or physically capable of taking appropriate action for self-preservation under emergency conditions as determined by program licensure provisions.

Home Care Providers

Home care providers in Minnesota are licensed under the provisions of Minnesota Statutes sections 144A.43-144A.482.

A **Home Care Provider** means an individual, organization, association, corporation, unit of government, or otherentity that is regularly engaged in the delivery of at least one home care service, directly in a client's home for a feeand who has a valid current temporary license or license issued under sections 144A.43 to 144A.482.

2023 DIRECTORY OF REGISTERED, LICENSED, AND CERTIFIED HEALTH CARE FACILITIES AND SERVICES

At least one home care service must be provided directly, although additional home care services may be provided by contractualarrangements.

Temporary Basic Home Care Provider License: This license is given to a new home care provider who is offeringservices as listed below for the basic level license and has met all conditions of licensure. It is valid for one year, during which time the provider will be surveyed by the department to determine if the provider is in compliance with home care requirements. Upon successful completion of the survey, the provider will be granted a basic homecare license.

Basic Home Care Provider License: Home care services that can be provided with a basic home care license are assistive tasks provided by licensed or unlicensed personnel that include: (1) assisting with dressing, self-feeding, oral hygiene, hair care, grooming, toileting, and bathing; (2) providing standby assistance; (3) providing verbal or visual reminders to the client to take regularly scheduled medication, which includes bringing the client previouslyset-up medication, medication in original containers, or liquid or food to accompany the medication; (4) providingverbal or visual reminders to the client to perform regularly scheduled treatments and exercises; (5) preparing modified diets ordered by a licensed health professional; and (6) assisting with laundry, housekeeping, meal preparation, shopping, or other household chores and services if the provider is also providing at least one of the activities in clauses (1) to (5).

Temporary Comprehensive Home Care Provider License: This license is given to a new home care provider who is offering services as listed below for the comprehensive level license and has met all conditions of licensure. It isvalid for one year, during which time the provider will be surveyed by the department to determine if the provider in compliance with home care requirements. Upon successful completion of the survey, the provider will be granted a comprehensive home care license.

Comprehensive Home Care Provider License: Home care services that may be provided with a comprehensive home care license include any of the basic home care services and one or more of the following: (1) services of anadvanced practice nurse, registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, physical therapist, respiratory therapist, occupational therapist, speech-language pathologist, dietitian or nutritionist, or social worker; (2) tasks delegated to unlicensed personnel by a registered nurse or assigned by a licensed health professional within the person's scopeof practice; (3) medication management services; (4) hands-on assistance with transfers and mobility; (5) assisting clients with eating when the clients have complicating eating problems as identified in the client record or through an assessment such as difficulty swallowing, recurrent lung aspirations, or requiring the use of a tube or parenteralor intravenous instruments to be fed; or (6) providing other complex or specialty health care services.

Home Management Services

A provider performing only home management tasks must obtain a certificate of registration from the commissioner of health. Home management services include at least two of the following services: housekeeping, meal preparation, and shopping provided to a person who is unable to perform these activities due to illness, disability, or physical condition.

Assisted Living

Assisted living providers in Minnesota are licensed under the provisions of Minnesota Statutes chapter 144G.

Provisional Assisted Living Facility License: This license is given to a new assisted living provider who is offering services as listed below for the assisted living facility level of licensure. It is valid for one year, during

which time the provider will be surveyed by the department to determine if the provider is in substantial compliance with the assisted living licensure requirements. Upon successful completion of the survey, the provider will be granted an assisted living facility license.

Assisted Living Facility License: Assisted living services that may be provided under an assisted living facility license include: (1) assisting with dressing, self-feeding, oral hygiene, hair care, grooming, toileting, and bathing; (2) providing standby assistance; (3) providing verbal or visual reminders to the resident to take regularly scheduled medication, which includes bringing the resident previously set up medication, medication in original containers, or liquid or food to accompany the medication; (4) providing verbal or visual reminders to the resident to perform regularly scheduled treatments and exercises; (5) preparing specialized diets ordered by a licensed health professional; (6) services of an advanced practice registered nurse, registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, physical therapist, respiratory therapist, occupational therapist, speechlanguage pathologist, dietitian or nutritionist, or social worker; (7) tasks delegated to unlicensed personnel by a registered nurse or assigned by a licensed health professional within the person's scope of practice; (8) medication management services; (9) hands-on assistance with transfers and mobility; (10) treatment and therapies; (11) assisting residents with eating when the residents have complicated eating problems as identified in the resident record or through an assessment such as difficulty swallowing, recurrent lung aspirations, or requiring the use of a tube or parenteral or intravenous instruments to be fed; (12) providing other complex or specialty health care services; and (13) supportive services in addition to the provision of at least one of the services listed in clauses (1) to (12).

Provisional Assisted Living Facility with Dementia Care License: This license is given to a new assisted living facility with dementia care provider who is offering services as listed below for the assisted living facility with dementia care level of licensure. It is valid for one year, during which time the provider will be surveyed by the department to determine if the provider is in substantial compliance with the assisted living facility with dementia care licensure requirements. Upon successful completion of the survey, the provider will be granted an assisted living facility with dementia care license.

Assisted Living Facility with Dementia Care: Assisted living services that may be provided under an assisted living facility with dementia care license include all of the services that may be provided under an assisted living facility license. An assisted living facility with dementia care license is required for a facility to advertise, market, or otherwise promote as providing specialized care for individuals with Alzheimer's disease or other dementias. Additionally, an assisted living facility with a secured dementia care unit must be licensed as an assisted living facility with dementia care.

Hospice

Hospices are licensed under Minnesota Statutes, section 144A.75, 144A.751-144A.756 and rules adopted thereunder.

A **hospice provider** means an individual, organization, association, corporation, unit of government, or other entitythat is regularly engaged in the delivery, directly or by contractual arrangement, of hospice services for a fee to terminally ill hospice patients.

Residential hospice facility means a facility that resembles a single-family home located in a residential area that directly provides 24-hour residential and support services in a home-like setting for hospice patients as an integral part of the continuum of home care provided by a hospice or, is a facility that meets the requirements of a residential hogieunder 144A.75 Subd. 13.

Supplemental Nursing Services Agencies

Supplemental Nursing Services Agencies are registered under Minnesota Statutes section 144A.70 – 144A.74

Supplemental nursing services agency means a person, firm, corporation, partnership, or association engaged for hire in the business of providing or procuring temporary employment in health care facilities for nurses, nursing assistants, nurse aides, and orderlies. Supplemental nursing services agency does not include an individual who only engages in providing the individual's services on a temporary basis to health care facilities. Supplemental nursing services agency does not include a professional home care agency licensed under section 144A.471 that only provides staff to other home care providers.

Health care facility means a hospital, boarding care home, or outpatient surgical center licensed under sections <u>144.50</u> to <u>144.58</u>; a nursing home or home care agency licensed under this chapter; an assisted living facility licensed under chapter 144G; or a board and lodging establishment that is registered to provide supportive or health supervision services under section <u>157.17</u>.

Classification and Bed Capacity

As of March 15, 2023, the number of licensed Facilities and Services and the total bed capacities were as shown in Table 1; their certification classifications were as shown in Table 2.
